A. ATTENDANCE AND ORGANIZATION OF WORK

Place and date of the meeting

1. The regional review meeting on the implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration in Latin America and the Caribbean was held online from 26-28 April 2021. It was jointly organized by the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) and the International Organization for Migration (IOM), in its capacity as Coordinator of the United Nations Network on Migration.¹

Attendance²

2. The meeting was attended by representatives of the following member countries of ECLAC: Antigua and Barbuda, Argentina, Bahamas, Belize, Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominica, Ecuador, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Jamaica, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Plurinational State of Bolivia, Portugal, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Trinidad and Tobago, Turkey, United States and Uruguay.

3. The following associate members of ECLAC also participated: Anguilla, Aruba, British Virgin Islands and Curaçao.

4. Attending from the United Nations Secretariat were: the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the human rights of migrants, the United Nations Special Rapporteur on trafficking in persons, especially women and children, and representatives of the United Nations Development Coordination Office, the Offices of the Resident Coordinators and the Statistics Division.

5. Also present were representatives of the United Nations system: the Committee on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families (CMW), the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN-Women), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the International Labour Organization (ILO), the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS), the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the World Food Programme (WFP), the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) and the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

6. Representatives of the following intergovernmental organizations also attended the meeting: the Latin American Integration Association (LAIA), the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), the Platform on Disaster Displacement, the Ibero-American General Secretariat (SEGIB), the Central American Integration System (SICA) and the Latin American and Caribbean Economic System (SELA).

7. The following cooperation agencies were also represented: Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation (AECID), ECHO Field Network of the European Commission, Panamerican Development Foundation (PADF) and Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ).

8. Also in attendance were representatives of national human rights institutions, parliaments, workers' and employees' organizations, local communities and authorities, migrant and diaspora organizations and academia.

9. The meeting was held in accordance with the following programme:

C. SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS

10. At the opening session, statements were made by Alicia Bárcena, Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC), António Vitorino, Director General of the International Organization for Migration (IOM), and Felipe González, United Nations Special Rapporteur on the human rights of migrants.

11. The Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) stressed that the work of the countries of the region, civil society, academia and regional processes and platforms contributed diverse opinions and perspectives that enriched the work in favour of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration. Migration was an issue that had a real impact on all the countries of the region, where hunger, persecution, poverty and inequality took on brutal forms that forced many people to seek other horizons outside their everyday space. Migration should be a choice, not an obligation. The conversation was focused on public policy. The complexity of migration in the region had been increasing, as shown by the movements in Central America and the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and the insufficient responses to “mixed flows”, the migration of unaccompanied children and the realities faced by receiving countries. She highlighted the economic and social difficulties facing the region, which she described as the hardest hit by the pandemic in the developing world. She also spoke of the impacts of climate change, which was aggravating the situation in some countries. Emigration figures were particularly high in the Caribbean and in Central America and Mexico. Migration was linked to human rights and required greater cooperation and an open, rich, fruitful and stigma-free dialogue.

12. In that context, at the request of the Governments of El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Mexico, ECLAC had coordinated the preparation of the Comprehensive Development Plan for El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and south-southeast Mexico, a proposal which, with a focus on growth, sought to address the structural causes of migration, and in which 19 United Nations agencies, funds and programmes, including the International Organization for Migration (IOM), had participated. It was necessary to consider inclusion and social protection policies. The Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration was a multilateral initiative aimed at migration governance and was in line with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Attention had to be paid to the potential contribution of the migrant population in their places of destination and to appreciate how much women had to contribute to the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. The dynamics of migration were complex, owing to, inter alia, the situation of unaccompanied minors, women who suffered various forms of abuse, persons subject to forced returns and victims of trafficking and smuggling. ECLAC called for cooperation and consideration of human dignity: migration was not a problem or a threat, but a common good that could contribute to the reduction of inequality. For decades, ECLAC had had a mandate on migration, rights and development, which was why safe, orderly and regular migration was a triad on which ECLAC had been working. She thanked the Latin American and Caribbean Demographic Centre (CELADE)-Population Division of ECLAC for its work and stressed the importance of the Montevideo Consensus on Population and Development. The Regional Conference on Migration and the South American Conference on Migration were important forums on the subject. Lastly, she reaffirmed the commitment of ECLAC to the Global Compact through a regional position, follow-up work and work with IOM and United Nations agencies and intergovernmental forums. The time had come to implement that unprecedented agreement, for the twenty-first century, as an expression of peace and humanity, with a focus on equality, a rights-based approach and a development approach; it was time to consider migration as a contribution to democracy, diversity and sustainable development.

13. The Director General of the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and Coordinator of the United Nations Network on Migration said that everyone’s presence at the meeting was testimony to a commitment to the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration, and expressed appreciation to ECLAC for its support in organizing the review process. Migration from and within the region had been a source of opportunity for millions of people and their families. He highlighted the persistence of factors that led to migration, including violence, inequality, poverty, lack of access to social security, informal work, political conflict, the impact of climate change, droughts and floods, combined with limited options for regular migration. The Global Compact was the first global framework developed under the auspices of the United Nations to enhance cooperation on all aspects of migration. It was also a unique opportunity to coordinate actions at the regional, national and local levels. The challenges facing the region in the process

of implementing the Compact included facilitating safe and regular migration channels, and protecting the human rights of the migrant population in transit, at the place of destination and in their communities of origin and return. In that regard, he highlighted the migration regularization programmes that several countries had launched in the region. The pandemic had hit the region especially hard, and particularly migrants, who had been on the front line in dealing with it in many ways, from health care to logistics. Despite this, many irregular migrants had been excluded from vaccination schemes, and he said that access to vaccines should be inclusive of migrants, regardless of their migration status. The regional review meeting on the implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration in Latin America and the Caribbean was an opportunity to exchange ideas on challenges, good practices and lessons learned in the practical implementation of its objectives and guiding principles. While the Global Compact had been negotiated and adopted by Member States for Member States, it covered all dimensions of migration and the entities involved, including those at the local, national and regional levels. He said that no challenge was insurmountable and stressed the importance of the Comprehensive Development Plan for El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and south-southeast Mexico.

14. The United Nations multi-partner trust fund to support the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration established under the Compact was a crucial instrument to support implementation as a coordinated, coherent and joint effort. Among the programmes developed by Member States and United Nations country teams, of nine programmes evaluated positively, one was being implemented and eight were on standby, indicating that additional resources were needed to meet expectations. With regard to the United Nations, he also spoke about the creation of seven national networks and one regional network on migration, as part of the issue-based coalition on human mobility. The Global Compact was a unique opportunity to organize and channel a global, inter-agency and inclusive response, and civil society, local governments, workers' and employees' organizations, parliamentarians, national human rights institutions, the media and other actors were key partners in the implementation of the Compact. That offered great potential, so there was a need to work together ever more effectively, to mobilize migration for sustainable development, to protect and assist migrants and to ensure that no one was left behind. In conclusion, he reiterated the full and unwavering commitment of IOM to migrants, their families —especially women and unaccompanied minors— and communities, and to countries of origin, transit and destination in the implementation of the Global Compact.

15. The United Nations Special Rapporteur on the human rights of migrants said that the Global Compact did not include just one mechanism to follow up implementation but comprised multiple elements. Among them, the regional review of implementation was an important tool. He stressed that although the pandemic had been a major obstacle to the protection of the human rights of migrants and to the implementation of the Global Compact itself, it was very important that those rights continued to be protected and that States continued to play a strong role in that regard. The Global Compact was a crucial instrument for strengthening a multilateral approach to migration, and the protection of the human rights of migrants was a central component. The gender perspective in migration was also important and should guide its implementation. Security, a legitimate element of migration policy, should be understood as a limit applicable only in certain cases and to certain human rights, not placed above the human rights of migrants. From the perspective of international human rights law, safeguarding the human rights of migrants should be the general rule, and security and other restrictions should only be invoked in a limited and restricted manner for certain rights, never, for example, for the right to life or physical or mental integrity, which were non-derogable rights. The Global Compact was not an instrument to limit the human rights of migrants, but should serve to ensure that coordinated migration policies among States strengthened migrants' rights. Its purpose was to manage migration and bring it into line with international human rights law.

16. The Special Rapporteur spoke about three aspects crucial to the implementation of the Global Compact. The first related to regular migration, which was included in the Global Compact, and permanent regularization processes, which were not included in the Compact but were indispensable; he called for these regularization processes to be permanent. The second aspect concerned deportations, which he said should be discontinued in the context of the pandemic; States had the power to carry out deportations, but it was not arbitrary. In a pandemic, violations of the principle of non-refoulement were much more likely in deportations, and the methods and publicity of deportations sometimes contributed to the stigmatization of deported migrants. The third aspect was access to public services, such as health, education and justice, and the importance of establishing firewalls or sanctuary cities so that migrants could access those services without fear of being deported because of their information being shared with migration agencies. Lastly, he called on the States of the region that had not yet done so to endorse the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration as an unprecedented and key instrument for multilateral development in the area of migration, in order to develop more efficient coordinated policies and better protect the rights of migrants.

17. The opening session ended with the intervention of civil society organizations, whose comments and proposals are reflected in full in the declaration in annex 1.

Review of progress and challenges with regard to implementing the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration in Latin America and the Caribbean

18. Claudia Blum, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Colombia, thanked IOM, the United Nations Network on Migration and ECLAC for their leadership in the review process. She said that her country had strengthened its public policies to provide a comprehensive response to the challenges of migration, was developing collaborative efforts with the participation of civil society and was emphasizing cooperation with other States and organizations. Colombia was the second largest recipient country for migrants in the world, supported its own migrants and returnees, and faced the challenges of being a transit country for migrants. It promoted regional dialogue for the humanitarian response and to address the threats posed by smuggling of migrants and trafficking in persons. The mass exodus caused by the multidimensional crisis in the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela was a primary challenge that had been addressed with careful consideration of human rights, gender and comprehensive child protection. Fundamental pillars were solidarity-based reception, access to basic social services and the promotion of regularization (the approval of the temporary protection status for Venezuelan migrants represented a historic step), as well as integration with equity that facilitated the transition from humanitarian assistance to the stabilization of life projects. Finally, he called for greater international cooperation to address the challenges arising from Venezuelan migration.

19. Hugh Todd, Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation of Guyana, thanked the organizers of the meeting for the support for his country and stressed that migration was not a new phenomenon, as migration to the United States and the United Kingdom had occurred previously, but Guyana was now receiving immigrants and his government was committed to taking action in that regard.

20. Denis Ronaldo Moncada Colindres, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua, reaffirmed his country's commitment to migration and the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration. He spoke of the structural causes of migration, such as the social exclusion of impoverished and vulnerable people and communities. In that respect, he stressed that blockades were obstacles that, along with the pandemic and poverty, aggravated the structural causes of migration. He highlighted the Special Law against Trafficking in Persons, the 2018–2022 national strategic plan for prevention, assistance, investigation, prosecution and punishment in relation to trafficking in persons, and the modernization of

migration checkpoints, along with the training of officials to identify vulnerable migrants who would receive gender-sensitive primary care, thus guaranteeing their protection and care.

21. Mark Brantley, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Aviation of St. Kitts and Nevis, stressed that climate change and migration had to be included in the development of disaster management strategies. In that regard, the pandemic had been a challenge as well as an opportunity. He underscored the importance of the diaspora and the efforts to protect it in the countries of destination. He requested technical and financial assistance and confirmed his country's commitment to the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration.

22. Olga Sanchez Cordero, Secretary of the Interior of Mexico, referred to the challenges the pandemic had raised in terms of migration. She highlighted the economic consequences of the pandemic in Latin America and the Caribbean and the great concern about the 18,890 unaccompanied migrant children and adolescents who had irregularly crossed the Mexican border into the United States in March 2021. Efforts had to be made to assist them and to address the causes of their migration, and her country wished to be part of the solution. In conclusion, she reaffirmed Mexico's position as an ally to provide protection, especially for migrant children and adolescents.

23. Carlos Torres Salas, Deputy Minister of the Interior of Costa Rica, spoke of good practices to guarantee and protect the rights of migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers. He stressed the commitment to upholding and guaranteeing rights in the context of the pandemic and called on the international community to exercise shared responsibility.

24. Carolina Ache Battile, Undersecretary of Foreign Affairs of Uruguay, said that the consequences of the pandemic had shown that migrants were the most affected and that universal solutions were needed. She also stressed the importance of establishing regularization as a cornerstone of migration policy to facilitate decent work and access to services. Finally, she stressed the importance of financial assistance to improve migration statistics.

25. Anayansi Rodríguez Camejo, Deputy Minister of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Cuba, denounced the blockade imposed by the United States on her country, which prevented, among other things, access to virtual platforms for meetings such as the one being held. The blockade was the main obstacle to the country's development and encouraged emigration. The fulfilment of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration would only be possible if the causes of migration were eliminated.

26. Carlos Alberto Velástegui, Deputy Minister of Human Mobility of Ecuador, highlighted the comprehensive nature of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration as it included origin, transit, destination, return and refuge, reflecting a coherent vision of human mobility. While cooperation had focused on humanitarian aid, it was not enough, as durable solutions were needed.

27. Patricia Comandari, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs, Integration and Economic Development of El Salvador, highlighted the impact of the pandemic in terms of job losses and reduced working hours and wages. In that context, her country had responded by taking measure to strengthen the consular network, prevent irregular migration, foster entrepreneurship among returnees and establishing a protocol of care for women returnees, among others.

28. Eduardo Hernandez, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of Guatemala, stressed that it was not possible for countries to address the issue of migration, especially that of the caravans, individually. More information campaigns were needed. That is why the Global Compact was essential and why a model for

the protection of children and adolescents was clearly needed. Finally, he said that the consular network was being strengthened to meet the needs of Guatemalans abroad.

29. Nelly Karina Jérez Caballero, Undersecretary of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation of Honduras, said that the number of accompanied and unaccompanied migrant children and adolescents had increased. The risks of the migration route had grown because of COVID-19, in addition to the impact of Hurricanes Eta and Iota. For Honduras, it was a priority to find rapid solutions to prevent the increase in migration and ensure that massive exodeses, commonly known as caravans, did not become normalized in the region.

30. Daniela Alejandra Rodríguez Martínez, Deputy Minister for Multilateral Issues of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, highlighted the positive impact of migration and called for avoiding security-focused and politicized approaches. She advocated for a holistic and human rights-based approach. She underscored an increase in returns, which involved more than 700,000 Venezuelans. She also highlighted the coercive measures that had been imposed on her country as part of a destabilization strategy in the framework of interventionist policies aimed at regime change.

31. Ana Laura Cachaza, Director General of Consular Affairs of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship of Argentina said that all countries were points of origin, destination and transit for migrants. Her country had taken measures to prevent the migrant population from being excluded from health care, and to respect the right to family reunification and to work.

32. Cecilia Erostegui, Director General of Consular Affairs of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Plurinational State of Bolivia, highlighted her country's commitment to the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration and the human rights-based approach. She spoke of her country's participation in MERCOSUR and in bilateral meetings to address that issue.

33. Julio Alberto Álvarez Sabogal, Director of the General Directorate of Peruvian Communities Abroad and Consular Affairs of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Peru, highlighted his country's commitment to migration. He highlighted the four areas of work on migration issues: Peruvians abroad, Peruvians who have returned to the country, Peruvians who wish to migrate and foreigners in Peru.

34. Jocelyne Clarke-Fletcher, Ambassador for Diaspora Affairs of Saint Lucia, said that emigration had left the country with a deficit, although a process of return was under way and being promoted by the government. Finally, she reaffirmed her country's commitment to the implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration.

35. Charmaine Gandhi-Andrews, Chief Immigration Officer in the Immigration Division of the Ministry of National Security of Trinidad and Tobago, expressed her government's support for the needs of migrants, especially Venezuelan migrants. In fact, there was a new policy that recognized the contribution of migrants to development, but she warned that uncontrolled migration could have negative effects.

36. Gilroy Middleton, Chief Executive Officer in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Foreign Trade, and Immigration said that continued collaboration with IOM, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and ECLAC was very important for his country. An example of that was the support provided by IOM to manage border crossing points in his country. Belize guaranteed the right to health and education and, since 2013, basic social security for regular migrants.

37. Karina Gould, Minister of International Development of Canada, said that during her visit to Colombia she had observed the difficult situation of Venezuelan migrants in that country, although they believed that Colombia was a generous country in terms of migration. Roughly 10% of Venezuelans had left their country. Migration could contribute to sustainable development, which should inspire the search for solutions to the challenges of migration in the region. Canada would organize a conference of solidarity with refugees and migrants to mobilize greater support and increase the visibility of the crisis. It would be an opportunity for countries to show their leadership in terms of integrating Venezuelan migrants. Canada considered the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration an important instrument. It was also important to focus on the gender perspective of migration, as women and LGTBIQ+ persons had fewer options and were at greater risk. Migration should be voluntary, orderly, safe and regular.

38. Catherine Holt, Director of the Office of International Migration of the United States Department of State, said that no country could handle the migration issue alone, and for that reason international cooperation was essential to guarantee safe, orderly and regular migration. The Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration provided a comprehensive approach that underscored the importance of international cooperation and offered a framework that optimized the benefits of migration at the international level while addressing challenges and risks for people and communities in countries of origin, destination and transit. The Compact also encouraged and allowed governments and interest groups to share responsibilities more effectively and was based on the values of respect, State sovereignty, shared responsibilities, non-discrimination and respect for human rights. Many objectives of the Compact were aligned with those of the administration of President Biden with regard to working with a broad coalition of partners to ensure safe, orderly and regular migration. The Government of the United States was focused on the causes of migration, strengthening collaborative efforts in the region to address the protection of migrants and also on strengthening legal migration routes. In order to underscore the commitment of the United States to safe, orderly and regular migration, President Biden had designated Vice President Harris to lead that effort. The United States would collaborate with Mexico and other countries in the western hemisphere in that regard. As part of that effort, it were committed to working on and addressing common challenges, finding solutions and protecting the dignity and human rights of all. She also said that the United States was reviewing its position with respect to the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration and would complete its assessment the following month, after which it would release a statement on its position.

39. Sónia Pereira, High Commissioner for Migration of Portugal, stressed that the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration was a fundamental instrument. Portugal had a plan for the integration of migrants that included measures such as the immediate assignment of a social security number for migrants and the expansion of the number of offices providing services for migrants. She underscored the commitment of Portugal to the dialogue on migration and integration, bearing in mind that it was a phenomenon that united many countries, and she reiterated the willingness of the High Commission for Migration to deepen the dialogue between regions.

40. María Noel Vaeza, Regional Director for the Americas and the Caribbean of UN-Women, said that it was not possible to think about public policies for migration without considering that human mobility sometimes affected more women than men and more women with young children, women who suffered from significant discrimination both in countries of origin and destination, who were victims of trafficking and constantly experienced discriminatory bias. For that reason, UN-Women supported countries to ensure they put women at the centre of migration and mobility and also supported implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration worldwide. Lastly, she said that UN-Women supported governments, civil society and especially women in situations of mobility.

41. Alejandra Corao, Regional Director for Latin America and the Caribbean, a.i., of UNAIDS, emphasized the difficulties migrants faced in accessing medicines and treatment for HIV, which affected migrants and countries in the region. She highlighted the invisibility of LGBTIQ+ persons, who were not mentioned in the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration. The review of the implementation of the Compact was a good opportunity to guarantee the rights of those population groups, including antiretroviral treatment regardless of migration status.

42. Claudia Coenjaerts, Deputy Director of the ILO Regional Office, said that the tripartite multilateral social dialogue on migration (governments, employers, workers) was an example of what could be provided as a system, in addition to technical assistance in the area of labour migration data and statistics. She underscored the importance of designing rights-based labour migration policies that included decent work.

43. Florbela Fernandes, Deputy Regional Director of UNFPA, highlighted the Fund's contribution with regard to specific information to protect persons in situations of mobility. She mentioned the key areas of action of the Fund, statistical visibility and its broad range of programmes to protect people in situations of mobility. She reiterated that migration should be a choice and not a necessity.

44. José Cruz-Osorio, Manager of the UNDP Regional Centre in Panama, said that the review of the implementation of the Compact was an opportunity for governments and all stakeholders to evaluate the progress made and the challenges of implementation. UNDP supported national and local governments in improving the benefits of migration for development in all its dimensions. He reiterated the commitment of support to leverage the mobility and socioeconomic integration of migrants in favour of development.

45. Jan Jarab, Representative of the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights in Chile, said that some countries had neglected migrants, forcing them to take more dangerous routes, in an environment of xenophobia and expulsions.

46. Claudio Santibáñez, Senior Adviser for Public Sector Partnerships of UNICEF, said that while States had made efforts, they were still insufficient in terms of migration. He called for reducing the adverse drivers of migration by integrating migration issues into development plans.

47. Felipe Muñoz, Chief of the Migration Unit of IDB, highlighted the role of the multilateral bank as a bridge between humanitarian issues and development. He mentioned the creation of a fund to which member countries had allocated non-reimbursable funding of US\$ 100 million to support development projects benefiting migrants and recipient communities. Work with countries focused on specific themes: regularization and identification of migrants as the gateway to a process benefiting the development of migrants; support in the provision of basic and social services such as health, education and housing; and the socioeconomic inclusion of migrants. IDB was also encouraging the private sector's participation in the provision of opportunities for migrants.

48. Daniela Alejandra Rodríguez Martínez, Deputy Minister for Multilateral Affairs of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, rejected the migration figures outlined by Canada and said that the related statements decontextualized the nature of Venezuelan migration flows to justify an agenda of intervention and profit. She said that both Canada and the United States had led maximum pressure campaigns against the Government of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, which had involved illegal unilateral coercive measures against economic sectors such as oil and mining. If the Government of Canada really wanted to help the people and Government of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela to address the causes of migration flows, then it should immediately end the unilateral coercive measures taken illegally against the country. Within the framework of strengthening the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration, it

was important to reject the excessive particularization of migration flows based on ethnicity, nationality or sex, for example, as it did not contribute to care for human dignity but rather worsened stigmatization and xenophobia. Lastly, she defended the principles of non-interference in internal affairs and respect for State sovereignty and territorial integrity and called for migration to be addressed through dialogue and cooperation that would not become a politicized instrument to affect countries' security and stability.

Key regional findings of national reports

49. Paulo Saad, Chief of the Latin American and Caribbean Demographic Centre (CELADE)-Population Division of ECLAC, highlighted the preliminary nature of the prepared report, which should serve as the basis for the final version of the regional report on the implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration in Latin America and the Caribbean that should take into account a number of other inputs, such as those from national reports and questionnaires that had not been considered in that version, inputs from previous consultations of regional platforms and civil society and other stakeholders, and the outcomes of the meeting being held. The preliminary report would constitute the regional contribution to the global review of the implementation of the Compact, which would take place during the International Migration Review Forum in 2022. He presented some of the main milestones of the regional review process, such as the series of thematic webinars and consultations carried out. The preliminary report included a very broad overview of migration dynamics in the region; a session describing the main findings and strategies, policies, programmes and actions reported by the countries to advance in the fulfilment of the Global Compact goals, and in which the challenges for further progress in implementation were identified; a session including examples of promising practices aligned with the objectives of the Compact and a session describing some conclusions and recommendations for implementation and for a future regional review. He drew attention to the impact the pandemic may have had on the process of preparing the reports, both on governments and on other stakeholders, but believed the quantity and quality of the material received was quite satisfactory. Fifteen country reports were considered: six from South America, six from Central America and three from the Caribbean, in addition to the questionnaires sent by eight regional and subregional platforms, processes and organizations.

50. Michele Klein Solomon, Regional Director for Central America, North America and the Caribbean of IOM, referred to the five thematic areas and guiding principles of the Global Compact relating to human rights, the gender perspective, the children's perspective, the whole-of-government and whole-of-society approach, and sustainable development. She presented a summary of progress and challenges in thematic areas 1 (promoting fact-based and data-driven migration discourse, policy and planning) and 2 (protecting the human rights, safety and well-being of migrants, including through addressing drivers and mitigating situations of vulnerability in migration). For example, in thematic area 1, progress had been made in actions such as campaigns, regulatory changes and programmes aimed at preventing and combating xenophobia and all forms of discrimination. As a challenge, she mentioned the need to increase research and broaden communication of the historical and current contributions of migration to the destination country. With regard to thematic area 2, she highlighted progress in prevention and assistance programmes aimed at mitigating or responding to situations of vulnerability of specific groups of migrants at different stages of the migration process and, as a challenge, the need to mitigate factors related to disasters, environmental degradation, climate change and other environmental phenomena.

51. Marcelo Pisani, Regional Director for South America of IOM, presented a summary of progress and challenges in thematic areas 3 (addressing irregular migration, including through managing borders and combating transnational crime), 4 (facilitating regular migration and decent work and enhancing the positive development effects of human mobility) and 5 (improving the social inclusion and integration of migrants). He highlighted the progress in the implementation of technological resources and integrated

border control mechanisms; in the reduction, simplification, streamlining and virtualization of migration procedures, and in the portability of social security and acquired benefits. As pending challenges, he highlighted the need for better identification and monitoring of recruitment methods and routes used by smugglers and traffickers of persons; the need to improve the protection of workers' rights and the punishment of those who commit labour abuses; and the need to guarantee access to basic services to all migrants, as in many cases, these were restricted or considerably limited depending on the migration status of the persons concerned.

Key regional findings of the consultation with multi-stakeholders

52. The findings were presented by representatives of civil society and other stakeholders.
53. Regarding thematic area 1 (promoting fact-based and data-driven migration discourse, policy and planning), some of the main challenges related to the need for cooperation between rights organizations, migrant organizations, diasporas and academia; to the need to define agreed indicators reflecting access to rights; to the need for investment in data at the municipal level and the need to address human rights violations and corruption in temporary work programmes.
54. Regarding thematic area 2 (protecting the human rights, safety and well-being of migrants, including through addressing drivers and mitigating situations of vulnerability in migration), the following needs were underscored: to address the structural causes of migration; to provide migrants with comprehensive, regional and transnational attention, through cooperation between States; to guarantee, through a differentiated approach, the protection of the LGBTIQ+ population; and to comprehensively assist and provide access to justice for the families of migrants who are missing or victims of executions and massacres.
55. With regard to thematic area 3 (addressing irregular migration, including through managing borders and combating transnational crime), emphasis was placed on the urgency of stopping the militarization of borders and migration corridors, in order to reorient border governance away from militarization towards a system that prioritized and harmonized all border procedures with human rights. Attention was also drawn to the need to strengthen child protection systems and prompt regional responses to ensure that families remained together in countries of origin, transit or destination; to put an end to the accelerated removal of unauthorized immigrants at borders and to create mechanisms to address cases of dead and missing migrants at borders.
56. With regard to thematic area 4 (facilitating regular migration and decent work and enhancing the positive development effects of human mobility), participants stressed the need to accelerate the regularization process to ensure the inclusion and protection of migrants in recipient countries, bearing in mind that migrants are rights holders, and decent work is one of those rights. Reference was also made to the need to recognize the positive contributions of migration, both in recipient countries and countries of origin; to promote equity and inclusion in the educational, labour and financial spheres through regional mechanisms for social security, accreditation and educational certification, among other measures, and to provide regional responses through international cooperation.
57. With regard to thematic area 5 (improving the social inclusion and integration of migrants), participants highlighted the serious difficulties of diasporas in obtaining documents (as in the case of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela where tens of thousands of children under the age of 9 lacked official photo identification documents). Emphasis was placed on the urgency of ensuring that the human rights component and the gender perspective had a central place in the implementation of the follow-up to the Global Compact; ensuring access to justice for migrants, especially those who were undocumented;

recognizing all the social rights of migrants regardless of their migration status and preventing the creation and continuation of situations of irregularity that caused vulnerability and exclusion.

Thematic round tables

Thematic round table 1: Promoting fact-based and data-driven migration discourse, policy, and planning

58. This round table was moderated by Christian Salazar, Regional Director of the United Nations Development Coordination Office, and participants included: Adriana Oropeza, Director of Technical Coordination of the Subsystem of Demographic and Social Information of the National Institute of Statistics and Geography (INEGI) of Mexico; Aníbal Sánchez, Deputy Chief of the National Institute of Statistics and Informatics (INEI) of Peru, Fabiana Goyeneche, Director of International Relations and Cooperation of the Municipality of Montevideo, Uruguay, and Marcela Cerrutti, researcher with the National Council for Scientific and Technical Research (CONICET) at the Centre for Population Studies (CENEP) and member of the Latin American Population Association (ALAP) and the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP) in Argentina.

59. The round table addressed issues such as the need for information on migration, challenges and steps to improve the collection of disaggregated data (including by sex and migration status) that would allow the region to have quality data on migrants, assess how far the region had come in establishing information systems and data sources, and how to move forward in the fight against discrimination. Participants underscored the need to recognize the existence of considerable heterogeneity in the region, which required flexibility, adaptability to the most important issues and consideration of not only national but also local problems. They emphasized the need for awareness of the fact that data collection systems were subsystems of several other subsystems of the State, and that despite that diversity, there had been many advances, successes and innovations, both in quantitative and qualitative data.

60. Data had to be an obligation of the State in terms of the transparency of information systems, and the establishment of adequate data protection mechanisms, whose main objective was also to measure progress and setbacks in the exercise of the rights of migrants, was fundamental. It was important to consider multisectoral approaches to the issue of migration and inter-agency coordination, including at the national and local level, and of actors from the private sector, the academic sector and other civil society actors. With regard to discrimination and xenophobia, it was necessary to develop a positive narrative, which would dismantle stereotypes, not only by building qualitative and quantitative data and indicators, but also by doing so in a way that was useful for institutions, raising awareness and involving the education system and the media. Cooperation and partnerships were recognized as key issues for human mobility; multilateral collaboration was an integral part of change in comprehensive information systems and played an important role in knowledge management. International collaboration and support were important not only for data management, but also for joint dissemination of sensitive and controversial issues.

Thematic round table 2: Protecting the human rights, safety and well-being of migrants, including through addressing drivers and mitigating situations of vulnerability in migration

61. This panel was moderated by Carolina Gottardo, Executive Director of the International Detention Coalition, and participants included Lance Browne, Senior Consular Officer of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Immigration and Trade of Antigua and Barbuda, Fábio Andó Filho, Chief Technical Adviser on Coordination of Policies for Immigrants and Promotion of Decent Work of the Municipal Secretariat of Human Rights and Citizenship of the Municipality of São Paulo, Lucas Gómez, Border Manager of the Office of the President of the Republic of Colombia, and Claudia Interiano, Regional Coordinator of the

Transnational Area of Fundación para la Justicia y el Estado Democrático de Derecho, and member of the Women in Migration Network (WIMN).

62. This roundtable analysed the main needs in terms of protection of the human rights of migrants in the face of multiple situations of vulnerability in Latin America and the Caribbean, and the main challenges and opportunities in the context of the pandemic to improve attention to the adverse factors of migration and their vulnerability. Cities were the first instance of integration of migrants. However, the action of the cities depended on existing powers and available resources. The closure of borders had limited access to immigration regularization, including asylum applications. This increased the vulnerability of migrant families and workers. The main needs involved the intersectorality of State responses. It was necessary to include children and adolescents, with a gender perspective. Multiple State actors should intervene to identify gaps to be addressed. The Global Compact could encourage a focus on guaranteeing rights with a differentiating factor, that did not revictimize women, that included differentiating approaches, that guaranteed labour insertion and that was permanent. It was also important to address xenophobia and the setbacks experienced during the pandemic.

63. In relation to vulnerabilities in the migration process, there was growing concern about the presence of women, children and indigenous people in massive and irregular migration flows. In São Paulo, authorities had adopted a policy to address the vulnerabilities of migrants that aimed to ensure access to rights without distinction, with gender parity, and to promote universal public services. One of the measures adopted by Colombia had been temporary protection status for Venezuelan migrants and progress in socioeconomic integration to ensure the contribution to development. Civil society organizations had documented massacres of migrants along the Central American route. Mass graves had been found and extrajudicial killings had been recorded. There were challenges relating to the criminalization of migrants. Detention was the ultimate expression of this criminalization. The use of detention was varied in the region, ranging from almost automatic in some countries to exceptional in others. It was important to include a human rights and gender perspective in the actions of the State on its borders, through the role of the human rights offices of the countries and consulates, in order to avoid setbacks in that area. Migration was influenced by the realities of climate change in the Caribbean; COVID-19 did not respect borders or migration status, so it was necessary to facilitate access to protection and health systems without discrimination.

Thematic round table 3: Addressing irregular migration, including through managing borders and combating transnational crime

64. This roundtable was moderated by José Monteiro, Country Director at International Justice Mission and General Coordinator of the Civil Society Coalition against Trafficking in Persons of the Dominican Republic, and participants included Siobhán Mullally, the United Nations Special Rapporteur on trafficking in persons, especially women and children, Alejandra Mángano, Coordinator of the Ibero-American Network of Specialized Prosecutors against Trafficking in Persons and Smuggling of Migrants, Ana Irma Rodas, Director of Assistance and Protection of Salvadorans Living Abroad of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of El Salvador, Elizabeth Cabezas, Assemblywoman of the National Assembly of Ecuador and member of ParlAmericas, and Verónica Supliguicha, General Project Coordinator of Fundación Alas de Colibrí.

65. The participants in the roundtable discussed progress, challenges and opportunities in implementing the objectives of the Global Compact related to irregular migration, including managing borders and combating transnational crime. Trafficking in persons and smuggling of migrants was proposed as a priority, so that necessary adjustments could be made to government programmes, budgets and actions. Reference was made to the need to find ways to prevent trafficking and smuggling of persons and to the capacity of local governments in border areas to contribute to coordinated border management, including

their contribution to public policy decision-making and the establishment of mechanisms for the regularization of migrants.

66. With the pandemic, risks had increased for irregular migrants, particularly women, reinforcing the structural inequality that underpinned discrimination on the basis of gender, race, ethnicity, and towards the LGBTIQ+ population. Another concern was how to address vulnerabilities in times of pandemic, since there were indeed aggravating factors, and it was therefore necessary to define priority actions on the basis of non-discrimination and the encouragement of a culture of solidarity. It was imperative to ensure that opportunities for regularization of the status of migrants were extended and that there was consular progress on inter-State coordination in the investigation of massacres and crimes against migrants.

Thematic round table 4: Facilitating regular migration and decent work and enhancing the positive development effects of human mobility

67. This roundtable was moderated by Andrés Pérez Esquivel, Director of International Affairs of the National Migration Department of the Ministry of the Interior of Argentina, with the participation of Olvin Villalobos, Minister of Labour and Social Security of Honduras, Jocelyne Clarke-Fletcher, Ambassador for Diaspora Affairs of the Government of Saint Lucia, Laura de la Fuente, Representative of the Global Network of Qualified Mexicans (Global MX Network) in Ireland, Joel Navarrete, Deputy Secretary-General of the United Workers Federation of Honduras (CUTH), and Rodolfo Cruz Piñeiro, Director of the Department of Population Studies of El Colegio de la Frontera Norte (COLEF) of Mexico.

68. This roundtable raised concerns about how to improve partnerships and institutional coordination to promote regular migration and decent work, labour policies, remittances, knowledge dissemination and trade union organization, among other issues. In Central America there were national inter-union committees with a regional orientation, through which they seek to have an impact on workers' rights. With regard to enhancing development impacts and improving decent work options, the idea of capacity-building for temporary labour migration, for example through skills certification, was mentioned. Workers were more familiar with the sector in which migrants worked and with their working conditions, and should therefore be involved in the discussion on migration policies.

69. One of the issues discussed was the identification of initiatives for remittance transfers. For example, in the Caribbean partnerships had been forged between financial institutions, money transfer operators and banks. There were also agreements in the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) and at the international banking level. Another issue addressed was the identification of measures to safeguard the rights of workers during the pandemic, for example domestic workers. Rights violations were intertwined, by sector of work and gender, which showed how difficult it was to comply with international standards for decent work, despite recent agreements such as the one signed between Nicaragua and Costa Rica to regulate temporary work. Finally, regarding the recommendations to improve the implementation of the Global Compact, the panellists agreed on the need to implement actions gradually and comprehensively with the participation of all stakeholders. Trade union members pointed out that the success of the Global Compact required the participation of workers in the discussion on labour issues.

Thematic round table 5: Improving the social inclusion and integration of migrants

70. This roundtable was moderated by Fernando Parra, Director of Migration Policy of the National Superintendency of Migration of Peru, with the participation of Joseph Hamilton, Minister of Labour of Guyana, Raquel Vargas Jaubert, Director General of Migration of the Ministry of the Interior and Police of Costa Rica, Alberto Echavarría, Vice-President of Legal Affairs of the National Business Association (ANDI) of Colombia, Laura Vázquez, Associate Director of Immigrant Integration of UnidosUS and Diego Chaves of the Migration Policy Institute (MPI) of the United States.

71. Participants in this roundtable argued that the COVID-19 crisis had shown that migrant labour was not a substitute for national labour, and that a country's economy could be seriously affected by the lack of a regular supply of migrant labour. Regularization of migration was the beginning of the path to the integration and social inclusion of migrants. This was not far from the establishment of a joint coordinated mechanism among countries to combat trafficking in persons and smuggling of migrants. These tasks involved equalizing the legal labour framework for nationals and migrants. Xenophobia and discrimination were the main factors hindering the integration of migrants, especially in the context of the pandemic. There was a clear lack of resources that affected the implementation of initiatives aimed at migrants and their families. The projects and initiatives had to be carried out by the host communities. There was a need to improve sources of information and data on migration in order to support decision-making. There was a need for training, skills retraining and recognition of studies of migrants. In Guyana, training and retraining programmes for migrant women had been implemented to help them acquire skills to participate in the economy, and also to provide education programmes for their children. In Costa Rica, a major effort was being made to document and unify databases at the national level (such as information on social security and the education system) in order to be able to coordinate the actions of all government institutions and provide comprehensive care for the migrant population. International cooperation benefited countries, but very little of those benefits were passed on to migrants.

72. In order to facilitate the regularization and documentation of migrants, complementary protection categories had to be created while regularization processes were under way. Processing times had to be reduced and expired documents brought by migrants had to be accepted. From the business perspective, the challenges of integration were related, among other dimensions, to cultural differences that could pose a problem in that regard; the family stability of migrants, which could hinder their integration; the adaptability of the migrants' knowledge and skills (because they needed accreditation); social protection systems that ensured stability over time (e.g. pension systems), and coordination with public entities. The migration policy of the United States had ignored the needs of migrant populations, which was reflected in the lack of an integration strategy for migrants. The experience of several states that had created a "new Americans" office was highlighted. A similar office was needed at the federal level to coordinate migration policy throughout the country. Poverty, poor digital access, linguistic isolation and low education among parents were factors limiting the integration of migrant children in that country. Support for immigrant parents played a key role in children's educational success, especially in times of pandemic. During the pandemic, the contribution of migrants in the United States had been indispensable, with five million irregular migrants doing essential work in the country and keeping the United States economy going, including feeding families across the country.

Closing session

73. Michele Klein Solomon, Regional Director for Central America, North America and the Caribbean of IOM, thanked IOM, ECLAC and the agencies, funds and programmes of the United Nations Network on Migration for their work. Latin America and the Caribbean faced a number of migration challenges, but

none were insurmountable, especially if the framework offered by the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration was respected. She highlighted the words of the Director General of IOM and Coordinator of the United Nations Network on Migration at the opening session, that the regional review was only the first step on a long road and a stepping stone towards the first International Migration Review Forum to be held in 2022. She reiterated the commitment of IOM to continue and reinforce joint work, since solutions had greater impact when efforts were collective.

74. Marcelo Pisani, Regional Director for South America of IOM, referred to the civil society recommendation relating to the need to create permanent mechanisms for dialogue that would favour the participation of those organizations in the follow-up, implementation and review of the Global Compact. He said that national and regional networks for migration would be key actors in deepening the implementation of the Compact at the national level, providing support to States and other social actors, including civil society organizations, who participated in the dialogue on migration policies in relevant spaces in the region, such as regional consultative processes, and in broad governance processes relating to the issue. He emphasized that the national networks and the regional network for migration, as an expression of the United Nations Network on Migration, provided a space for the agencies of the system to coordinate and create synergies to address migration challenges and opportunities, thereby contributing to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

75. He said that there was a need for a greater focus in the implementation of the Global Compact on the inclusion of the LGBTIQ+ population and to shed light on migration from Africa and Asia, with Latin America and the Caribbean as the region of transit or destination, in order to offer more adequate responses. The outcomes of the meeting would be important inputs for the preparation of the regional report, which would be the region's contribution to the global review and would also serve to align the strategies and work plans of the different spaces where the issue of migration was addressed in the region, as well as the work with each country. With regard to the recommendations that would emerge from that meeting, he noted that they addressed a wide range of actions that would improve programmes and projects, along with regulatory frameworks, and give substance to the dialogue in favour of migration governance in the region.

76. Lastly, Alicia Bárcena, Executive Secretary of ECLAC, invited the participants to bear in mind the migration, human rights and development triad, stating that ECLAC considered migration an opportunity for individuals, families, communities and countries, as long as it was the result of a voluntary and informed choice. Although the Global Compact represented great challenges for the region, there were also significant advances, especially considering the context of the health crisis. She expressed her satisfaction at having heard the commitment of all governments to the objectives of the Compact and at the insistence in all thematic round tables on the importance of highlighting its guiding principles. In the short term, it was necessary to work on regularization and access to channels for regular migration. Migration was safe when migrants' rights were respected throughout the migration cycle; orderly, when it was an informed and free choice, not forced or compelled by coercive factors, or the only option; regular, when in addition, migrants were able to access facilitation channels that minimized adversities, especially the most vulnerable groups. She underscored the need for data to inform policy, to protect migrants at all stages of the migration cycle and to build strong partnerships for migration governance. ECLAC was committed to people, their social inclusion and development with equality, and called for the creation of all possible mechanisms for civil society, platforms and all stakeholders to continue contributing to the implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Annex 1

MESSAGE FROM CIVIL SOCIETY AT THE OPENING SESSION OF THE REGIONAL REVIEW MEETING ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE GLOBAL COMPACT FOR SAFE, ORDERLY AND REGULAR MIGRATION IN LATIN AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN

Warm greetings from civil society organizations and from young members of civil society. Those who participated have decided to share this message with you through Nancy Pérez of Jóvenes por el Cambio / Major Group for Children and Youth (MGCY) and Berenice Valdez, Bloque Latinoamericano sobre Migración.

This intervention combines the voices of networks and civil society organizations such as MGCY, Red Sin Fronteras, Fundación Consulado Cívico, Save My Identity, Caribe Afirmativo and Bloque Latinoamericano sobre Migración, participants in the consultation convened by ECLAC and the regional office of IOM, together with many organizations. We share the need to develop a process on inclusive regional migration, beyond the visions of existing regional platforms such as IOM and ECLAC. It would have to adopt the highest standards of participation, transparency, oversight and monitoring with all stakeholders and States, and create permanent mechanisms for coordination and action, based on respectful, democratic and inclusive dynamics and spaces.

We believe that civil society participants and forums in the Latin American and Caribbean region, as well as the Latin American migrant population outside the region, for example in the United States and Europe, along with their communities and families, are not represented in this regional review. However, we know that this process is new and is a learning experience for all stakeholders, agencies and regional platforms. We are confident that we will contribute to its development and see its impact.

We propose the consideration of good practices regarding participation through the United Nations Network on Migration at the global level, other regional processes such as those relating to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and processes in other regions such as Asia, and through the trust and strength built in the relationship between the new ECLAC and IOM regional platform for migration and organized migrants, their families and civil society organizations working on the defence and promotion of the rights of people in situations of mobility.

We believe that this review mechanism is very important, as the reality of Latin America and the Caribbean and of Latin American migrants in other regions and continents means that efforts are still required to ensure people have the right to migrate with the full guarantee of and respect for their human rights and that conditions are improved to ensure people are not forced to migrate. Migration should be a right that every person in the region can exercise freely, that is achieved with real channels for the regularization of migration and for regular entry. A number of proposals have been made, including in the process of developing the Compact; we are now waiting for the regional mechanisms to initiate their implementation, for which the States are responsible.

The region faces significant challenges; in 2019 alone, Latin America was the recipient of the largest number of asylum applications worldwide, as a result of the crisis in the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and the increase in violence and insecurity in Central America. The situation has worsened because of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic and the effects of forced displacement and natural disasters such as Hurricanes Eta and Iota in Central America. As a result, the safest option for many are the migrant caravans departing from Central America, which consist of hundreds of women, children, adolescents, young people, men and LGBTIQ+ persons fleeing for their lives, in search of safety and a

dignified life free of violence or in search of justice for their missing or murdered migrant family members. Meanwhile, Haitian, Cuban and African migrants continue to travel through the Darién jungle, one of the most dangerous routes in the world not only because of its geography but also because of the presence of armed groups and drug traffickers, and through Mexico, one of the largest corridors in the world where violence has increased during the pandemic. Yet another massacre of migrants occurred in Tamaulipas, on the border with the United States, while the new United States administration decides its immigration agenda which will have an impact on the entire continent and on the world. In South America, just this weekend, we observed a collective expulsion of migrants, one of several planned by the Government of Chile, which violate a number of rights, due process and international principles.

In light of the thousands of lives at risk, the need for action to create dignified living conditions and to guarantee the right to migration and to international protection, a discussion of orderly, safe and regular migration should not signify a setback in the region. Instead, it should facilitate the implementation of all policies based on the highest standards of human rights and international law, gender and an intersectional analysis of realities and exclusions, to ensure affirmative measures towards equality, the right to life and dignity, which should not be negotiable. While the Compact mentions national sovereignty, it also emphasizes shared responsibilities because no country can address the challenges and opportunities of the global phenomenon of migration on its own and has an overarching obligation to respect, protect and fulfil the human rights of all migrants, regardless of their migration status (paragraph 11 of the Compact).

It is an honour to share with my colleague Nancy this message regarding young people, who make up most of the population of migrants in our region, and a pleasure to share this moment with all of you, and we thank you for your attention. We are making this plea to be able to prompt action, to be able to ensure coordination that can really be measured in impacts. The United Nations has already developed human rights indicators and we hope that these indicators and all the work that has been done through the United Nations system will be reflected in the implementation of the Compact. As members of civil society, we are confident that the 10 principles of the Compact, the gender, human rights and whole-of-society approaches will be put into practice and will not only be mentioned in every meeting or tagged on to the end of statements as a politically correct flourish. We want to see this Compact implemented in a process involving civil society participation, we want to see it implemented in the access to rights of migrants, their families and their communities. We want the principles of non-repetition to be guaranteed in the face of the serious issues we experience in the region, such as massacres. This month marks three years of massacres with victims buried in hidden graves in Mexico. We want this to stop. We want the Compact to be a watershed for action, to ensure that, as Antonio Vitorino said, change is possible if we believe it. As Alicia Bárcena said, we must draw on the strength and contribution of all population groups, of women in particular, of persons with diverse sexual identities that have been segregated and that belong to one of the groups facing the greatest violence in migration in our region.

The causes must be addressed in order to guarantee not only protection and the right to migrate, but also the right to not migrate; ECLAC has emphasized this point a lot and we want to see it become the reality with the participation of civil society. What conditions must be met for people to not migrate? In the face of such adverse conditions and risks to life, we want this to be the beginning of a real process, in which all stakeholders are involved in the building effort alongside governments. We know that there are many difficulties and that there are pressures beyond nation States and we want to contribute through assistance and advocacy, because we are already doing so. Most of the work on the ground, in the shelters is done by civil society and various religious organizations. Thus, we want to coordinate our decades of experience to be able to contribute and have specific proposals.

We propose:

- (1) Creating a permanent mechanism for regional actors that includes the participation of civil society, of organized migrants in Latin America, the global North, the United States, Europe and elsewhere. Of course, this would involve the leadership of ECLAC and IOM through their existing platforms, but making use of the entire United Nations system, as the Special Rapporteur on the human rights of migrants, Felipe Gonzalez, has already indicated. This process would include the participation of global actors through the United Nations Network on Migration and its Executive Committee, but also national participation. We have been asking for this opportunity for decades, for coordination at global, regional and local levels, to be able to build and work together. There should be facilitation of dialogue defining coordinated strategies in the implementation of the Compact. Establishing a permanent platform would be the first priority. We do not want there to be a search for speakers every time an event is held or for someone to participate in a specific round table. We want a follow-up process. The stakes are high.
- (2) The second proposal is that the evaluation of the implementation of the Compact should not stop at this exercise; it is a first exercise that has been more about learning, rather than developing solutions that affect our territories, our Latin American brothers and sisters, our communities and migrants. We want this effort to go beyond a presentation or participation in a global forum, under the highest standards of human rights, under the legal framework of public international law, in particular, international humanitarian law and international human rights law. The evaluation must adhere to fundamental principles of law and impact indicators; otherwise this assessment will be incomplete, as we cannot just keep stating good practices. The assessment must be accurate, addressing the 23 Goals, but establishing priorities for different time frames. These elements, along with many others that ECLAC, IOM and the United Nations are already aware of, must be implemented in this assessment.
- (3) The third proposal is related to strategic vision, as of course we have to be strategic because each day we must make strategic life decisions. We are experienced in this and we want this to be reflected in global and regional spaces through a **priority monitoring agenda with impact indicators**, which recognizes the contributions of people in situations of mobility, particularly women, children, young people, their families and migrant communities.
- (4) The fourth proposal is to include in the **reception policies and recommendations for migration services all the differential approaches that guarantee assistance from a rights perspective and that are based on the principle of equality and non-discrimination**. This has to be **adopted both in assistance and in the messages conveyed**. The United Nations must create a strong, powerful narrative that goes beyond assistance to incorporate the public message of inclusion and of the valuable contributions of people in situations of mobility, migrants, their communities and those of us who defend the rights of migrants.
- (5) Finally, as the compact is a guide for the States, it is also a guide for society, and should encourage cooperation based on good practices, but also define measures to eliminate the serious risks and include all people, migrant women, young people, children and the LGBTIQ+ population. There is a need for recognition of this mixed migration and the examples in which international protection has not yet been recognized. In our region there are thousands of people in this situation who require differentiated attention with measures adopted by the States.

We consider these five pillars crucial and have outlined them for your consideration, that of the entire State apparatus and of the United Nations. We, members of civil society organizations across the region and Latin American migrants, want to join this effort and contribute. Thank you very much.
